Places to See

Eye catching panoramas are found in abundance on Anglesey – the largest AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) in Wales. Here are is a summary to whet your appetite but please just ask us if you would like to know more!

Ancient Ruins	Mighty monuments, burial chambers and Neolithic ruins can be found across the island – in fact there are over 130 scheduled ancient monuments here each with their own tales of a by-gone age. From Din Lligwy on our doorstep to Barlcodiad y Gawres and Bryn Celli Ddu slightly further away.
Art Galleries	You will find a plethora of art galleries as you wind your way along the islands country lanes. Don't be afraid to stop and take a look at these small independent studios. Exhibitions from famed artists such as Sir Kyffin Williams and Charles Tunnicliffe can also be found at Oriol Ynys Mon and Oriol Tegfryn.
Bridges	Take a stroll along the banks of the Menai Straits to absorb the beauty of Thomas Telfords Menai suspension bridge. Delve deeper and you may discover the magnificent stone lions that guard Britannia bridge – replicas of those found in Trafalgar square.
Castles	Delve deep into Anglesey's history with a visit to what is described as one of the best designed Medieval fortresses in Britain – Beaumaris Castle. Also here are the old gaol and courthouse.
Churches	We are blessed to have an island full of beautiful churches. Learnt about Saint Dwynwen, the Patron Saint of Lovers, at Llanddwyn or marvel at the splendour of some of 15 th century stained glass windows in the grade II listed church, Llanwenllwyfo.
Geological Wonders	Anglesey is an internationally recognised GeoPark. With rocks spanning 4 Eras and 12 Geological periods, 1,800 million years of history has fashioned more than 100 rock types – many of which can be seen as you explore the coast.
Houses and Gardens	Anglesey is a gardener's delight - Choose to peak at small Open Gardens, explore the beautifully restored walled gardens at Plas Cadnant, or stroll around the expansive grounds of Plas Newydd, moving inside if the weather fails to the grand manor house, home to Rex Whistlers 1930's masterpiece.
Lighthouses	All of our lighthouses are in simply stunning locations. Be brave and descend the 400 steps to tour the inside of Southstack lighthouse, to take a boat trip for a unique view of Penmon Point.

Museums	For a small island, we have a lot of museums! Learn about our copper mining history (Amlwch Copper Kingdom), our maritime traditions (Anglesey Maritime Museum), our heritage (Swan Heritage Museum, and Menai Heritage Centre), the history with horsepower (Tacla Taid transport museum)
Windmills	There were once over 50 working windmills on the island. Most have now been converted, with only one remaining as a working mill. Find out about the workings of Llynon Mill and purchase some traditional wholemeal flour.
Woodlands	We are fortunate on Anglesey to provide a perfect habitat for Red Squirrels. Explore one of our many nature reserves and woodlands and you never know what beautiful wildlife you may spot.
