Things to do

We have compiled a summary list of things to do on Anglesey, however there are many more exciting adventures to be had just over the bridge on the mainland. Remember we are just a stones throw from Snowdonia where a whole other world of attractions are available.

Bird Watching	Anglesey is an ornithologists paradise as an AONB with many SSSI's you can be sure to view a vast array of bird life including Puffins, Choughs, Gannets, Manx shearwaters, Arctic terns, many Birds of prey and much more.
Boat Trips	For those with a spirit of adventure combine a white-knuckle RIB ride whilst getting an offshore view of some of our iconic landmarks. For a calmer trip, head to Beaumaris and hop on a day cruise along the Menai Straights and around Puffin Island.
Climbing	Anglesey boasts fantastic opportunities for scaling cliff faces, or if the weather is poor head indoors to the Indy Climbing Centre for some of the best climbing and bouldering in North Wales.
Coasteering	Get up close and personal with our stunning shoreline whilst clambering up cliffs, leaping into our waves and swimming in our crystal clear sea.
Crabbing	Crabbing at the coast can be great fun for both children and adults. Crab from the cliffs at Lligwy or try the harbour wall at Cemaes or Beaumaris Pier. It can be almost as much fun watching them scurry sideways back to the sea when you release them!
Cycling	You can head in any direction and be assured of breath-taking scenery by pedal-power. For a more structured experience navigate one of the way-marked circular trails.
Diving	Over 100 wrecks line the waters of Anglesey coast so experienced divers can explore captivating reefs, pinnacles and drop-offs as well as coming face to face with an array of marine life.
Family days out	Whether you want to see bugs and butterflies (Pili Palas), fish and marine life (Anglesey Sea Zoo) or friendly farm animals (Foel Farm) Anglesey boasts dozens of attractions for kids and grown-ups of all ages.
Fishing	Whether you want to try fly-fishing, or coarse fishing, shore fishing or deep sea angling there are options for all. Our nearest coarse fishery is less than 5 minutes' walk away or had to Lligwy Beach and cliffs to be in with a

	chance of catching Mackerel, Bass, Codling, Dogfish, Dabs, Plaice, Pollock, Strap Conger, Whiting and Wrasse.
Golf	For such a small island, Anglesey has a surprising number of golf courses. In total there are 7 courses, all of which are tactically challenging. Choose between perfectly manicured parklands at Henllys, or bunker-free Baron Hill. Whichever the course, there's one thing that you're guaranteed of – spectacular views!
Horse-riding	What could be better than trotting along the shoreline or galloping through the waves. Anglesey has several riding schools offering everything from hacks, to showjumping and cross-country lessons.
Kayaking / Paddle boarding	Hug the coast whilst paddling gently, taking the opportunity to observe rugged rock formations, secluded cover and hidden caves.
Motorsports	Anglesey Circuit hosts an array of exciting motor events for professional and amateur racers. If you fancy getting behind the wheel yourself book a Supercar experience, or get closer to the track in a go-kart at Cartio-Mon.
Sailing	With harbours and marinas aplenty Anglesey is home to 5 sailing clubs. Our closest club is Red Wharf Bay and offers short and long course options for all ages and abilities.
Kite-surfing	Head over to the south-west of the island to some of the UK's best waters for surfing. If it's a bit chilly to join in you can marvel at the experts as they show off their tricks.
Rock Pooling	Inspire your children by exploring the magical world that is left behind as the tide retreats. These glorious pools host a dazzling assortment of fascinating creatures as well as a host of interesting sights, smells and textures.
Swimming	If the sea is a little chilly then do not fear, there are 5 leisure centres on the island with indoor pools, each offering special activity programmes in school holidays.
Walking	It goes without saying that you can walk in any direction imaginable and be assured of finding spectacular sights. From Tyddyn Isaf you can choose to explore the coastal footpaths in either direction from Lligwy Beach, spotting the odd porpoise or dolphin as you travel.
